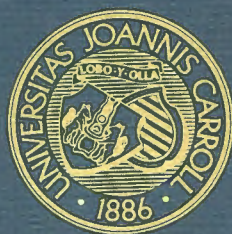

John Carroll University takes its name from John Carroll (1735-1815), the first Catholic Bishop in the United States. He became Bishop of Baltimore in 1789, after five years as Superior of the American Mission. A Jesuit for some twenty years until the suppression of 1773, he was a man of good theological background, and possessed of an historical perspective. He had definite ideas about a liberal arts education, was well-read, and showed himself open to the new experience of the young Church in the United States.

THE ALUMNI MEDAL

The Alumni Medals are conferred annually as the highest award of the John Carroll University Alumni Association upon alumni and others who have, through the distinguished conduct of their lives, either brought extraordinary credit to the university or contributed conscientious service to the Alumni Association, or both. The recipients of the award this year are:

JOSEPH T. O'BRIEN

Class of 1931

Churchill shrewdly observed, "We make a living by what we get, but we make a life by what we give."

Our Honoree has met the test of such an exacting standard time and time again over three-quarters of a century. While for some it may be a fault never to say no, for Joe O'Brien it is his greatest virtue. If he ever denied a request for help from a Catholic youth group, church, university, or social agency, the day has gone unrecorded.

An extremely successful businessman in the highly competitive automobile sales industry, he has earned a reputation for fairness and honesty and has been singled out by his peers for numerous honors. A devout and fervent Catholic, he credits his success in business and family life to the 17th century North American Indian maiden, Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha, to whom he prays daily, and for whose beatification and sainthood he has worked tirelessly for forty years.

In recognition of his charity and devotion as an alumnus, his leadership in business, his responsiveness to community needs, and his exemplary Catholicism, the Alumni Association is honored to present its Alumni Medal to Joseph T. O'Brien of the Class of 1931.

MOST REVEREND WILLIAM M. COSGROVE, D.D.

Class of 1938

On becoming Bishop of Belleville, Illinois in 1976, our Honoree told his flock, "As I understand it, my job as a preacher is to inspire you and to inspire myself to forget ourselves so that together we can do something for somebody else." That philosophy has epitomized his more than four decades in God's service.

A 1938 graduate of John Carroll University, he completed his studies at St. Mary Seminary and was ordained in 1943. After a decade as assistant pastor of Akron's St. Vincent and Cleveland's St. Ignatius Parishes, he was named spiritual director of the high school and college departments, and professor of history, at St. Charles Borromeo Seminary. He received his master's degree from John Carroll University in 1959.

In 1960 he was named a Papal Chamberlain, and in 1966 he became a Domestic Prelate, pastor of the interracial St. Henry Parish, and first chairman of the new Senate of Priests. He was elevated to Auxiliary Bishop of his native Cleveland Diocese in 1968.

He served as Vicar General and Consultor, and he was founder and co-chairman of the Commission on Catholic Community Action — an instrument of social change that combined church, governmental, and private effort to help eradicate poverty, racism, ignorance, and violence. In 1971 he was named to the City Planning Commission and the Community Relations Board, and in 1975 he became pastor of Conversion of St. Paul Parish.

In Belleville, to fulfill his promise to the people of Southern Illinois "to address the spiritual and material needs of the community, especially those of the poor," he launched an ambitious and multifaceted effort. Among his accomplishments: a non-profit corporation to rehabilitate homes, provide jobs, and initiate other community

revitalization projects; an ecumenical program to provide food, transportation, and housing for the elderly and poor; an endowment trust to support diocesan high schools; the reorganization, expansion, and centralization of diocesan education offices; the establishment of the Catholic Center, which houses the Chancery and the headquarters of diocesan services and commissions.

Even in retirement — which Pope John Paul II granted him for health reasons in 1981 — our Honoree has continued some activity in the Cursillo Movement and a renewal program for inmates of Illinois prisons. Shortly after he retired, the St. Vincent de Paul Society opened for the poor in East St. Louis a facility that had long been one of his goals. Fittingly, it was named “Cosgrove’s Kitchen.”

Shepherd, social activist, educator, man of God — he is all of these and more. The Alumni Association is privileged to confer the Alumni Medal on Bishop William M. Cosgrove of the Class of 1938.

ARTHUR J. NOETZEL, Ph.D. Class of 1938

Ad majorem Dei gloria — to the greater Glory of God.

The Latin phrase stands as the motto of the Society of Jesus, but it also characterizes the work ethic of Dr. Arthur J. Noetzel, whose devotion of Jesuit Education at John Carroll University matches that of the outstanding members of the Society who have served the institution.

A bachelor of science graduate of the Class of 1938, Dr. Noetzel prepared for his long career in teaching and administration at the University by earning a master’s degree in business administration at Northwestern University and a doctorate from the University of Michigan.

His first teaching assignment at John Carroll was as an instructor in accounting in 1941 and, a year later, he became assistant professor of business administration. Still today, alumni of the School of Business acclaim his Business Policies course as one of the most beneficial classroom experiences of their collegiate education.

In 1956, Dr. Noetzel was chosen to become dean of the School of Business, a position he occupied with distinction until his appointment in 1970 as the University’s first lay academic vice president. Dr. Noetzel retires from his vice-presidential office today to return full-time to the teaching of business students.

Active in the world as well as the academy, our Honoree has served as chairman of the trustees of St. Vincent Charity Hospital, a trustee of Borromeo Seminary, adviser to the Minority Economic Development Corporation and the Federation for Community Planning, and chairman of the University Heights Development Commission. His community hailed him in 1981 as the Outstanding Citizen of University Heights, Ohio.

For his achievements, his humanity, and his faithful service to Jesuit Education, the Alumni Association is honored to present the Alumni Medal to a distinguished Son of Carroll, Dr. Arthur J. Noetzel of the Class of 1938.

JOHN C. WASMER, JR. Class of 1945

Within every constituency is a nucleus of members who are the doers and shakers who can be counted upon to surge the organization ahead. Jack Wasmer belongs to this nucleus at John Carroll.

Personally generous. Loyal. Firmly committed. Since 1973, Mr. Wasmer has served on the University’s highest council, its Board of Trustees, as chairman of its Student Affairs Committee and as a member of the Development Committee. Through his benefactions and those of his parents, the University proudly wears the Wasmer name on its athletic stadium and on the first Chair of studies established in its School of Business. Many, many other of Mr. Wasmer’s generous assistances pass quietly, without public notice, yet they significantly influence for the good the quality of academic and campus life.

As chairman of the Lake Erie Screw Corporation, Mr. Wasmer oversees the operations of the family business, a major manufacturer in the fastener industry and employer of a number of John Carroll alumni. Mr. Wasmer has been actively involved as well, in roles of volunteer leadership, at St. Ignatius High School, Lakewood Hospital, United Way, Catholic Charities of Greater Cleveland and on the board of WVIZ-TV.

For all he has done in service to John Carroll for the past 35 years as an Alumnus, Trustee, Benefactor, and Friend, the Alumni Association confers, with pride and with gratitude, its Alumni Medal on John C. Wasmer, Jr., of the Class of 1945.

REVEREND WILLIAM J. BYRON, S.J., was born in Pittsburgh and grew up in Philadelphia. After graduation from St. Joseph's High School, he entered the United States Army, in the 508th Parachute Infantry. After studies at St. Joseph's College and St. Louis University, he was ordained in 1961. He received his Doctorate in Economics at the University of Maryland. He taught social ethics and directed field education at the Woodstock Theological Center in New York City; was named Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at Loyola University, New Orleans, and went from there to be President of the University of Scranton. He became President of The Catholic University of America in 1982. The creation of that University was called for by the third Plenary Council of Baltimore, in 1884, just one hundred years ago. He is published widely, is interested in poverty and its structures. He showed an early interest in mergers, in the effects of automation, and what happens to people when economics works its implacable laws.

Anyone speaking of DOROTHY FULDHEIM must begin by calling her a Cleveland institution. It would be impossible to list the number of her lectures, the number of world personalities whom she has interviewed. She turned from the lecture platform to what was then a new medium, television, and became the first woman in America to have a show of her own. Many years later, she is still a fixture, commenting nightly on an aspect of the news, and drawing on a depth of knowledge which is habitual and remarkable. She has crisscrossed the globe, interviewing personalities from the world of politics, culture in the arts, intellectuals of all sorts. No subject is foreign to her; throughout all of her long and eventful life, she has shown a great sympathy for the lives and the joys and the sufferings of ordinary people; the mysteries of evil, death and war have puzzled her deeply. Her own views are always clearly expressed; she prepares her interviews carefully, and is extraordinarily courteous to her guests.

REVEREND JOSEPH O. SCHELL, S.J., has occupied many positions at John Carroll University. Celebrating his fiftieth anniversary as a Jesuit in 1981, he came to John Carroll after graduate studies at the University of Toronto. He taught philosophy, especially logic, and was Chairman of the Philosophy Department. He spent many years in the residence halls, and was in charge of them for some time. He was moderator of the Jesuit Honor Society, *Alpha Sigma Nu*; active in the Sodality movement, both for students and for alumni; was Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, and became both President of the University and Rector of the Jesuit Community in 1967. It was in his presidency that the undergraduate College of Arts and Sciences and School of Business became co-educational — to the delight of students and the relief of administrators. He has been an indefatigable advisor to students, to alumni and to friends. He designed the present Campus Ministry structure and was so imaginative as to place in immediate proximity the Rathskeller and the Chapel. He retires from the University in 1984 but will continue his work in Campus Ministry.

ACADEMIC DRESS

European universities show more diverse costumes than do American schools. In the procession, both sorts will be seen. Generally:

Gowns

The Doctoral gown has bell sleeves with velvet trim. More commonly black, but it can be the color of the academic discipline. The Master's gown has half or oblong sleeves. The Bachelor's gown has the long pointed sleeves; and it is always closed in the front.

Hoods

Doctors, Masters, and Bachelors are 4', 3½' and 3' respectively, and all are black. The color of the velvet is distinctive of the subject to which the degree pertains, e.g., Arts, White; Business, Drab; Education, Light Blue; Law, Purple; Philosophy, Dark Blue; Science, Golden Yellow; Social Work, Citron; Theology, Scarlet. All hoods are lined with the official colors of the school conferring the degree.

Caps

The traditional is the mortarboard, though the tam and the Elizabethan will be seen on some of the faculty. The tassel is most often black, Doctors frequently wear gold, and lawyers wear purple.
