



#### FOOTBALL HISTORY AT CARROLL

For generations football has been the great American intercollegiate sport; not, however, until September, 1920, did the autumnal call to the gridiron penetrate the inner precincts of St. Ignatius College, now better known as John Carroll University. It was at the summons of Coach "Tuffy" Conn that the first squad ever to report for a football team at the college turned out; and, as was to be expected, no little anxiety was felt as the boys girded themselves for their initial plunge into intercollegiate football.

From a little team with a minority standing, no history and a doubtful future, the successive teams of this institution have battled their way upwards until now they are ranked among the major aggregations of the country. Each year has found a larger and a more experienced squad reporting for the team, but each year has, also, found the eleven confronted with a schedule more and more difficult. So sure has been this advancement that the fine array of opponents met, and for the most part vanquished, in the 1924 season is topped only by the present pretentious schedule which includes no easy games whatsoever.

Dayton University, soon to become a traditional foe of Carroll, was met in the first game and defeated by the score 13-0. An auspicious inaugural! Playing through a schedule of six games the tenderfoot team registered victories over Hiram, Ashland and Niagara University, dropping

only two contests, to Mt. Union and St. Xavier.

Encouraged by these victories, the following year the team prepared to tackle a longer and more difficult schedule. "Toby" Erdman had been engaged as coach, and under his guidance the team again made ready to open the season with Dayton. This game was dropped by the margin of one touchdown, 13-6. It was soon apparent that sailing would not be easy. Injuries and losses occurred one after the other, making the season



a real problem for Erdman and his charges. Led by Captain Eddie Mc-Fadden the team fought every team to a standstill, and while but two victories were gained, one over Baldwin-Wallace, the other over Kent, three of the games were dropped by the margin of a lone touchdown. So gallant a spirit was displayed by our boys that they merited the title, "The Fight-

ing lrish," which had recently been conferred upon them.

The autumn of 1922 found Coach "Ike" Martin, assisted by Frank Burke, at the helm. Better material and a larger squad turned out at the call and under the leadership of Jimmie Smith, Ignatius trounced Kent Normal 34-0. This inaugurated a victorious season marred only by Dayton's 20-13 triumph. Strong teams such as Mt. Pleasant, St. Xavier, St. Bonaventure and Niagara University fought vainly and broke against the

barriers reared by the "Fighting Irish."

For the first time the aggregate score of an Ignatius team had topped the total gleaned by its opponents, and that by a goodly margin, 163-61. So with greater vigor and ambition the authorities turned to the prepara-

tion of the grid card for 1923.

St. Ignatius College had, meanwhile, become John Carroll University, and the 1923 campaign was heralded by a squad of university proportion and calibre. Led by Captain Dick Lang the team attacked a schedule which featured no less than three teams of national fame. To Carnegie Tech and West Virginia Wesleyan were dropped close and hard-fought contests, while the powerful University of Detroit team was held to a 0-0 tie at the height of the season. Dayton was trounced 21-0 to even the series between the two teams, and three other strong elevens taken into camp. Although St. Xavier and Canisius defeated Carroll, the team had gained an even break in spite of a most strenuous season.

It was during this year that the team became known as the "Blue Streak." The fast attack with which Carroll set upon its opponents and







Gregory ("Irish") Conly '26 is captain and guard playing his last year for the Blue and Gold. He has held down a guard position for two years and has been a vital factor in making the Carroll line practically impenetrable. He spent a year at Notre Dame where he teamed with the great Castner. "Irish" is a product of St. John's Prep School of Boston, Mass.

Joseph ("Joe") Crowley '26 is back with the squad after being absent one season. Joe is a graduate of Cathedral Latin where he performed at the center position, but has been converted into a tackle of no mean ability.

Robert ("Bob") McCaffery '28 is a cool thinking and hard fighting quarter. He lacks weight and experience now but a year or two under Elward's tutelage should make him into a regular. Bob was taught the fundamentals of football at St. Ignatius.

John ("Jack") Toma '28 came to Carroll from Quincy, Ill., with a reputation as a quarterback which he has not lost. As a freshman last year he surprised everyone and gives promise of doing even greater things this season.

Hubert ("Red") McCaffery '27 is playing his second year in the Carroll line. Red is a fighter in the nth degree and it is very seldom that the opposition makes any substantial gains through his guard. He prepped at St. Ignatius High.

John ("Rabbit") Hunter '29 is a shifty little fellow who called signals last year for Warren High of Warren, Ohio. This is his first year in collegiate circles and he is working hard to make good.

James ("Jim") Gowan '27 is the speedy halfback of last season who has been shifted to quarter. He can pass as well as carry the ball and is a valuable interference man. He played with Latin two years before coming to Carroll.

Howard ("How") Lasby '28 is an end skilled in the art of catching passes while on the run. He is fast and adept at diagnosing plays. He received his training at St. Ignatius.

Eugene ("Gene") Murphy '28 is a guard who hits with all his might and means it. Little worrying need be done when Gene is in there. He is another product of St. Ignatius High School.

the general speed of its play were the factors which won this title for the team.

Under the direction of a new coach the "Blue Streak" swept to greater fame in 1924. Although "Ike" Martin had left, Burke remained as assistant, and the school was fortunate enough to secure the services of "Mal" Elward, who, some years before, had starred with Knute Rockne at end on the Notre Dame University team. Elward was, of course, a strong advocate and able coach of the famed Notre Dame system of play.

Under Elward's direction the good team of the previous year was succeeded by one yet more excellent. Victories over such elevens as Canisius, Lombard, Detroit and North Dakota were victories of which any team may be proud, which further spread the fame of the "Blue Streak" and upheld Elward's reputation as being the coach of winning elevens (a name gained by his prosperous seasons with Service teams and a remarkable success at Grinnell College, Iowa).

Marquette, fresh from its triumph over the Navy, experienced a setback when with difficulty the "Golden Avalanche" chalked up a 10-3 score against Carroll. Dayton's surprising victory marked the only other defeat on a schedule of nine games. All in all it was the finest record yet turned in by a Carroll team.

And now the team has entered upon a schedule of truly formidable proportions. It includes no easy games, and more than a few feature contests. Several losses can reflect no discredit on an eleven which has come up so fast some upsets are to be expected in such a headlong career—while a victorious season will vindicate in full the promise John Carroll University has made in its short gridiron history.



Harold Storey '28 is playing his first year as regular at center. He is a sure passer, having the enviable record of not making one bad pass in the two years he played with Youngstown Rayen. He plays a roving center and is adept at breaking up an aerial attack.

Michiel ("Mike") Bosch '29 is a tackle of great promise. Although but a freshman he has had several opportunities to demonstrate his worth under fire and has shown to good advantage. He prepped at Quincy, Ill.

Thomas ("Tom") Charvat '26 is a tackle. Tom will don the Blue and Gold uniform for the last time on Thanksgiving Day and the Carroll team will lose one of its most earnest workers. He is large and husky and hence is able to stop any play that is aimed at him.

Ralph Sapp '28 played a regular end last year but during the early games of the 1925 schedule has entered the game as a halfback. He can punt well and is exceptionally good at catching passes. His high school training took place in Colfax, Iowa.

Thomas ("Tom") Ganon '28 is a half-back with a reputation of a forward passer. He can toss a perfectly timed ball into the hands of the receiver. He punts well and is also a daring open field runner. Ignatius High was his training school.

John ("Jack") Fitzgerald '29, a speedster from Youngstown South, entered Carroll as an end but because of his ability on the defense is being tried out at center.

Robert ("Bob") Siedler '28 is playing his first year of football. He reported for Spring practice, determined to become a football player, and has advanced in rapid strides. He plays an end position and is from Illinois.

Terrence ("Doc") Pfaff '26 has played at tackle since he came here four years ago. Injuries have followed Doc through every season but each time he comes back for more. His hobb has been blocking punts. He prepped at Little Rock, Arkansas.


