Director's Note

At a time when commercialism poses a legitimate threat to the pure intention of art, it is perhaps only a negative example which can assert the necessity of a positive. This, it seems, is the central message of *Speed-the-Plow*: if art falls to industry, more than what is mentionable is inevitably lost. Perhaps it would seem that industry profits from the production of mediocre work; but when the hope of creating something worthwhile, when the ideal itself is diminished, so is humanity. Destroy idealism, and all will follow.

We hope that, if we have done our work well, you will wish for and demand the more frequent production of good art; or at least that you will find our presentation to be an articulate reminder of a personal conviction: that a work produced merely for "entertainment value" is superfluous, since good art, by nature, has entertainment as a by-product. Where industry falls short, art promotes enlightenment, and communication.

All art is quite useful.

She has acted in various productions, including The Crucible (Elizabeth Proctor), Ten Little Indians (Vera Claythorne), Could Angels Be Blessed (Lucy Clifford), and The Diviners (Jennie Mae). She plans to study acting and, pending acceptance, will enter graduate school in the fall.

James E. Parker* (Set & Lighting Design) — Speed-the-Plow marks Jim's debut in set design. However, his lighting design credits are numerous, including: Grandma Duck is Dead, The Nerd, Ten Little Indians, and Big River. Mary Katherine Thomas (Stage Manager) appeared in the JCU mainstage production of *The Crucible* as Mary Warren. She was assistant stage manager for the Kulas production of *Baby*, and Nancy Keifer's *The Eighth Order*, for which she was also assistant director. She worked with Misery Loves Co. in the productions of *Camille* and *Housewives in Heat (Indiana)*. She is presently pursuing her master's degree in English at JCU, and hopes in future to direct for the stage.

The Company

Jim Driscoll* (Bobby Gould) is a senior at JCU with a communications major and a history minor. Among his favorite roles was Badge in *Grandma Duck is Dead* in last year's Little Theatre production. Last semester he co-wrote and co-directed "Upon Visiting the Lavatory" in the *Hold the Script* improv show. He recently finished co-writing a full-length play, entitled *Embers*.

Jeff Walker (Charlie Fox) is a junior psychology major and business minor. It wasn't until this year that Jeff became active in the theatre. He was last seen as Huck Finn in JCU's production of Big River. Formerly, he was a chorus member in 42nd Street, George M., and Kiss Me Kate.

Megan Torok (Karen) while in her first semester at JCU appeared in both Big River and Hold the Script. During her years at Magnificat High School, she played such roles as Mary Magdalene in Jesus Christ Superstar and the Baker's Wife in Into the Woods. Presently, she is auditioning for conservatories within the New York area.
