Retiring faculty who have impacted the university greatly

Casimir (Casey) Bukala, S.J., Professor of Philosophy



Fr. Bukala is not only a Cleveland native, but a John Carroll University alumnus, who graduated with an A.B. in Philosophy in 1954 and an M.A. in Religion in 1955. After serving in the army at Fort Knox in Kentucky

for two years, he entered the Society of Jesus in 1958 and was ordained in 1966. Casey received his Ph.D. in Philosophy from Boston College in 1970 and started teaching at JCU that fall. With a specialty in existentialism and phenomenology, Casey also offered courses about modern European philosophy, philosophies of love and friends, metaphysics, and the ethics of forgiveness. His publications about existentialism and Sartre include. for example, a contribution to the volume Critical Essays on Jean Paul Sartre and the Journal of the British Society of Phenomenology. A recipient of John Carroll's Distinguished Faculty Award in 1981, Casey continued to be recognized for his contributions to the university, as he was awarded the Centennial Medal in 1986, the University Alumni Service Award in 1999, and the Alumni Medal in 2002. As his colleague Brenda Wirkus observed, "He defines 'pastoral,' and he has successfully integrated the pastoral with the professional and the personal." Famous among generations of students for his drawing and explanations of the existentialist perspective (One of which is: "I am the artist. I am the clay. What am I making of myself?"), Casey has been called a good friend and mentor to us all.

Thomas R. Evans, Professor of Psychology



In 1967, Dr. Evans earned his Ph.D. from the University of Texas in Austin. During that time, he worked for the Tracor Corporation and the Central Intelligence

Agency. In 1970, he was hired as the chair of the (then) Psychology Department, which was still in its infancy as a new department on campus. Under his capable leadership, the department expanded its course offerings, and his work in the area of Violence and Aggression was quickly recognized as an important and growing field in the discipline. By 1974, he became the Director of the Begun Institute for Studies of Violence and Aggression at JCU. During that time, he worked as a staff psychologist for the Psychiatric Clinic of the Cuyahoga County and Cleveland Criminal Courts, conducting forensic evaluations of convicted felons, as well as serving as an expert witness. His professional affiliations include: American College of Forensic Examiners, International Society for Research on Aggression, American Board of Forensic Examiners, and the Ohio Police Chiefs Association. He has had interviews about terrorism published locally and internationally, including an article about the impact of the war on terror published in the European Edition of the Wall Street Journal. During his 45 years of service, Dr. Evans has influenced the lives of thousands of JCU students who remember him for his willingness to lend an ear and his ability to captivate their imaginations and stimulate their intellectual curiosity with four decades of incomparable experiences.

William L. Langenfus, Associate Professor of Philosophy



Specializing in ethical theory and philosophy of law, Dr. Langenfus has taught courses in those areas, as well as business ethics and social and political philosophy, since

arriving at John Carroll in 1990 with a Ph.D. from the University of Wisconsin. Particularly active in curricular development and student support in pre-law advising, Dr. Langenfus has also contributed his expertise in ethics to teaching and curricular workshops and advisory committees across campus, including most especially the Applied Ethics Program. His publications include articles in the History of Philosophy Quarterly and the American Philosophical Quarterly, as well as an essay in the collection Paradigms in Political Theory: Marxism, Liberalism, Postmodernism. In addition to the invaluable guidance of students interested in legal careers Dr. Langenfus has provided, his colleague Earl Spurgin praises his willingness to discuss research plans and offer comments about papers and otherwise contribute to the intellectual vitality of the department.

Distinguished Faculty Award

Renowned in the field of Japanese Studies, Dr. Long is the author of seven books, 24 chapters in essay collections, and 32 journal articles. Among numerous service accomplishments, she was the founding director of the East Asian Studies Program at John Carroll and a member of the Japan Foundation's American Advisory Committee. In a testament to her exemplary teaching and advising, one of her students wrote: "Throughout our college careers, many professors come into our lives, but only a few provide the wisdom and inspiration that lead us to become better people. Dr. Susan Long is one of those very special professors who selflessly provided me with guidance, mentorship, and the desire to reach above and beyond."

Joan Nuth, Associate Professor of Systematic Theology and Director of the Ignatian Spirituality Institute



With a Ph.D. from Boston College and an M.Div. from the Weston Jesuit School of Theology, Dr. Nuth arrived at John Carroll in 1987 and, in addition to her duties

as a professor, took on the Ignatian Spirituality directorship in 2002. Author of Wisdom's Daughter: The Theology of Julian of Norwich and of God's Lovers in an Age of Anxiety: The Medieval English Mystics, Dr. Nuth has

also written a number of articles about ecclesiology, mysticism, and feminist theology. A stalwart director and advisor of the departmental graduate program and graduate students, Dr. Nuth has taught an array of courses about Contemporary Catholic Theology, Ignatian Spirituality, and women in the Christian Tradition. Her service to the Diocese of Cleveland has also been extensive, including many years on the Lay Leadership Program Advisory Committee of the Jesuit Retreat House and the Diocesan Pastoral Ministry Board. She also continues to be active in the Catholic Theological Society of America and the Society for the Study of Christian Spirituality. As one of her graduate students and colleagues noted: "Her academic work at John Carroll is reverberating across Cleveland and

beyond, due to her 'sending forth' of trained Spiritual Directors through the Ignatian Spirituality Institute. It is difficult to go to previously underserved communities throughout Cleveland without making contact with those who received their training with Joan Nuth in JCU's ISI."

Antonio Perez-Romero, Associate Professor of Spanish

A native of Cuenca, Spain, Dr. Antonio Perez-Romano studied in Spain, England, France, and Canada where he received his Ph.D. from the University of Toronto in 1988. He had been teaching language, culture, and literature courses at JCU in the Department of Classical and Modern Languages and Cultures since 1992. As a scholar, he is the author of Subversion and Liberation in the Writings of St. Teresa of Avila (1996) and The Subversion Tradition in Spanish Renaissance Writing (2005). Antonio also published several articles about Spanish mystical writing and Golden Age literature. Presently, Antonio is preparing a book about the concept of womanhood in Early Modern Spain and researching the lives and works of women playwrights of the Baroque era for future critical publications. He is also involved in a book about Spanish painting of the Golden Age. Antonio also raised cuisine to a fine art, volunteering every year to coordinate the reception for the CMLC department's annual "Meet Your Major" event. Antonio inspired everyone in the department to contribute a gourmet dish to the reception's pot luck offerings, which led to the event becoming legendary and hereafter known as "Eat Your Major."

Antonio is a Renaissance man who was an energetic, interesting, and very lively colleague. He had a steady stream of students who visited his office not just for academic course work help, but to discuss a variety of scholarly topics. Antonio had a total involvement in students' intellectual lives, and he had genuine interests in their pursuits, joys, and sorrows. As Martha Pereszlenyi-Pinter told him, "Antonio, you don't have students, you have a following."
