John Carroll University takes its name from John Carroll (1735-1815), the first Catholic Bishop in the United States. He became Bishop of Baltimore in 1789, after five years as Superior of the American Mission. A Jesuit for some twenty years until the suppression of 1773, he was a man of good theological background, and possessed of an historical perspective. He had definite ideas about a liberal arts education, was well-read, and showed himself open to the new experience of the young Church in the United States.

CHESTER B. LYNN, A.B.

Class of 1936

It is said that "enthusiasm finds the opportunities, but energy makes the most of them." Our Honoree's distinguished career is eloquent testimony to this thesis.

Enthusiasm and energy are the traits which have carried Chester B. Lynn to the chief executive officer's seat in a major national corporation, Lawson Products, Inc., of Des Plaines, Illinois, and to a pre-eminent position in the industrial parts distribution industry.

Mr. Lynn prepared for leadership at Cleveland's St. Ignatius High School and at John Carroll University, where he was a member of the first class to graduate from the University Heights campus. True to the Jesuit educational regimen of the day, he majored in Philosophy, minored in English, and immersed himself in the Classics.

Though international conflict twice delayed his business ambitions — he served both during World War II and Korea — it failed to dim his characteristic drive to succeed. In 1958, Mr. Lynn joined Lawson Products to launch a career that revolutionized his company and his industry. Through his successful development and management of a nationwide chain of independent sales representatives, Lawson Products has grown during its "Lynn Era" from less than \$1 million in sales to more than \$100 million annually. In 1978, in honor of his 20th year with the company, Lawson established the Chester B. Lynn American Values Scholarship to assist John Carroll students.

In recognition of his notable business career, his continuous support of university programs and alumni activities, and his exemplary devotion to his family as a husband and father for more than four decades, the Alumni Association is honored to present its Alumni Medal to Chester B. Lynn of the Class of 1936.

ERMA BOMBECK, whose insight it is that children are a punishment from God, was born in Dayton and attended the University of Dayton. She worked at the *Journal-Herald* there, and after marriage to William L. Bombeck, spent a decade at home, raising three children — Betsy, Andrew and Matthew. Her adventures there revealed the mysteries and the terrors of the home, and the truth about the suburbs. Her column, in which so many women, and indeed, families, recognize themselves, is syndicated in some 800 newspapers nationally; collections from those columns have appeared as books with extremely imaginative titles. Mrs. Bombeck is frequently on television, and now manages the tyranny of her column, her many appearances, and articles for national magazines, from Phoenix, Arizona.

DOROTHY GAUCHAT attended Notre Dame College of Ohio, and left to marry William J. Gauchat. They were both greatly influenced by Dorothy Day, and by the ideas of Peter Maurin. The Gauchats, with a family of their own, were asked to take a dying child into their home. The child lived — on their love — for a longer time than anyone expected. Since that time, as individuals, and as people believing that they could make a difference by being a neighbor to those who were in need, and without the help or the style of institutions, they planned, and built, Our Lady of the Wayside, in Avon, Ohio, where the *thou* of the developing exceptional child is prime. Mrs. Gauchat, after the death of her husband, carries on her work with the help of private contributions. She also has a home called The Croft for children after they've reached 21 years of age, but still stand in need of a caring place.

WILLIAM A. KINNISON was born in Springfield, Ohio; attended Wittenberg University, Wisconsin and Ohio State Universities. He and his wife, Lenore, have three children (one of whom was confirmed this morning). He became president of Wittenberg in 1975. In 1982, he, a Lutheran layman, was appointed by the presiding officers of three Lutheran church bodies, to be the general chairman of a commission to form a new Lutheran church body in America. This process is now ongoing. This significant drawing together of the church is of great ecumenical interest. Lutherans have a tradition of attention to liberal education, and Wittenberg is an example of that. 1983 (300 years since the first migration of Germans to the New World) is the fifth centenary of the birth of Martin Luther, great figure of the Reform, and professor at Wittenberg "the older."

WILLIAM M. MCVEY, born in Boston, educated in Cleveland; after a stint at Rice where he played football for Heisman (born in Ohio City, by the way) he came back to the Institute of Art. In Paris, he studied under Despiau, where he came to know *les animaliers* tradition, whence his interest in sculpting animals. The bank holiday of the early thirties made him an overnight tour guide. The British Embassy has his famous statue of W. S. Churchill; there is also a heroic head of W.S.C. at Chartwell, and the Smithsonian; and the "Churchill Porch" at the National Cathedral. Tireless teacher, excellent lecturer, his *oeuvre* covers man and beast. In their *atelier* home in Pepper Pike, his artist wife, Leza, and he work on, after teaching in Texas, Michigan, and at the Cleveland Institute of Art.

We are the arms of the armless God who pushed out long ago or push out, now, in Spring of life, our faith, still, in the Power that sinews arms.

Ocean to our receding waves,
Singer of the songs we sing,
Ground of our nights and days,
No-thing, yet Source of All:
If there are fathers, He is Father,
if there are mothers, She is Mother,
if there are brothers, sisters, they are there
implicitly;
Beyond, yet in our midst;
Nameless, yet of our lips
that whisper
to our child
and that whisper
never lost
but retained.

"I seek You as You would have me seek You, I pray as You would have me pray, I am quiet, now, with Your nameless Life, Am in love, now, with Your Juda Fire, Am still, now, in stipes3 of Your night, Awake, now, in patibulum4 of Your day, Empty, that You may fill me, And fool, that I may be your child."

ACADEMIC DRESS

European universities show more diverse costumes than do American schools. In the procession, both sorts will be seen. Generally:

Gowns

The Doctoral gown has bell sleeves with velvet trim. More commonly black, but it can be the color of the academic discipline. The Master's gown has half or oblong sleeves. The Bachelor's gown has the long pointed sleeves; and it is always closed in the front.

Hoods

Doctors, Masters, and Bachelors are 4', 3½' and 3' respectively, and all are black. The color of the velvet is distinctive of the subject to which the degree pertains, e.g., Arts, White; Business, Drab; Education, Light Blue; Law, Purple; Philosophy, Dark Blue; Science, Golden Yellow; Social Work, Citron; Theology, Scarlet. All hoods are lined with the official colors of the school conferring the degree.

Caps

The traditional is the mortarboard, though the tam and the Elizabethan will be seen on some of the faculty. The tassel is most often black, Doctors frequently wear gold, and lawyers wear purple.
