Work on Union Bldg. Begins in Late Summer

"Work will get underway late this summer on the new Union Building."

That was the word received this week by students and faculty from the Development Office, on the state of the current development fund and building program.

With that, the first construction under the present \$2.6 million drive to provide a Student Union Bldg., Transportation Hall, and a Gymnasium, will have started.

Mr. H. H. Kennedy, vice president in charge of development, announced that the University architects had been given the go-ahead signal to prepare working blueprints for the first of three buildings to be erected facing Washington Blvd.

"Preparing these drawings will take about two months, accepting bids from contractors will take another month, and allowing for the usual delays, we expect to turn the first spadeful of earth late this summer," said Mr. Kennedy.

The continuing three-year program to raise funds for capital expansion began last November under the general chairmanship of Mr. Kenyon C. Bolton, prominent Cleveland civic

and business leader. More than a million dollars has been collected.

Many, Bright, Frosh Is Autumn Outlook

Prospects for one of the largest entering freshman classes in Carroll's History appeared bright this week, with the announcement by Mr. Eugene R. Mittinger, University Registrar, that over 325 young men have already been accepted for the fall semester.

"We expect that we will have a class of nearly 600 freshmen when classes begin in September. If the present trend continues, we will reach that number of accepted students by mid-August," Mr. Mittinger commented.

Students, faculty members, and advisors will be on hand to greet Open House visitors, explain University programs, and show off campus buildings, grounds, facilities, and equipment, according to the Very Rev. Frederick E. Welfle, S.J., President of the University.

Some 50 demonstrations and exhibits are planned to illustrate every phase of Jesuit and lay training and student activity at Carroll, one of 27 American colleges operated by the Society of Jesus.

Represented in the program are 40 academic departments and student organizations. Twelve science laboratories will reveal vibration equipment, zippered "experimental" cats, model eyes, ultrasonic speech transmission, and a student-constructed \$50,000 spectrograph used in metallurgical study.

Carroll's ROTC, largest Transportation Corps unit in the country, will display model railroad cars, harbors, ships, trucks, planes, and other miniature vehicles as well as "cutaway" models of modern weapons. Special events highlighting the 1955 Open House include:

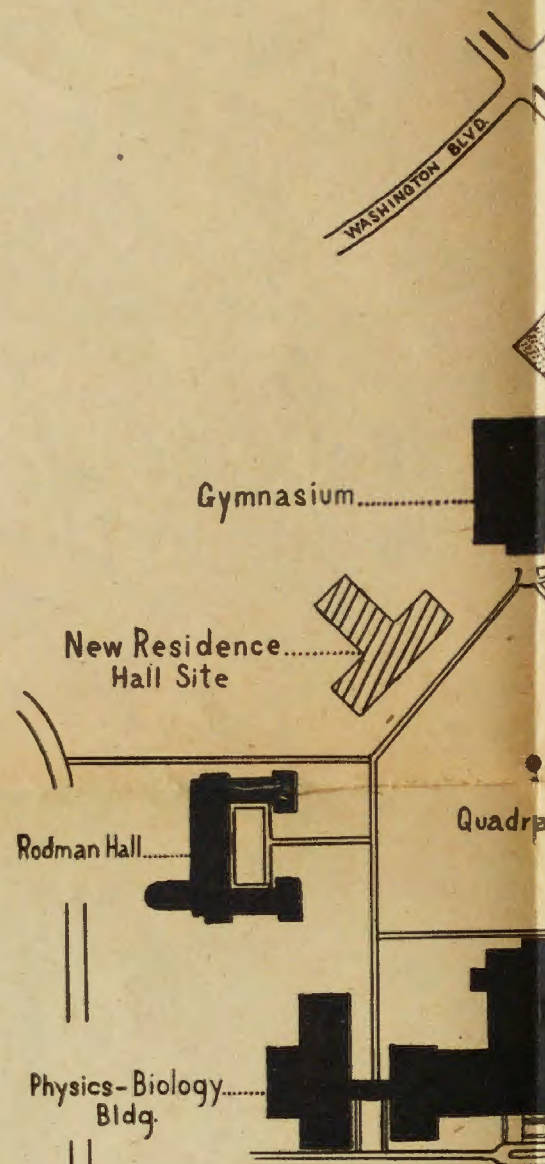

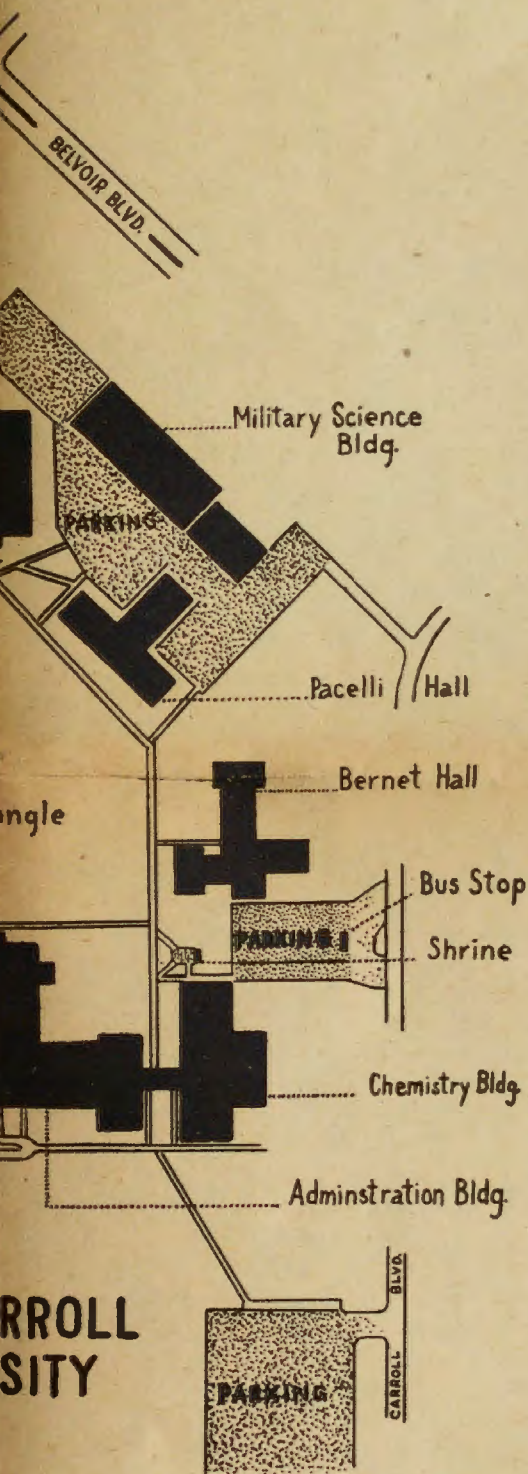

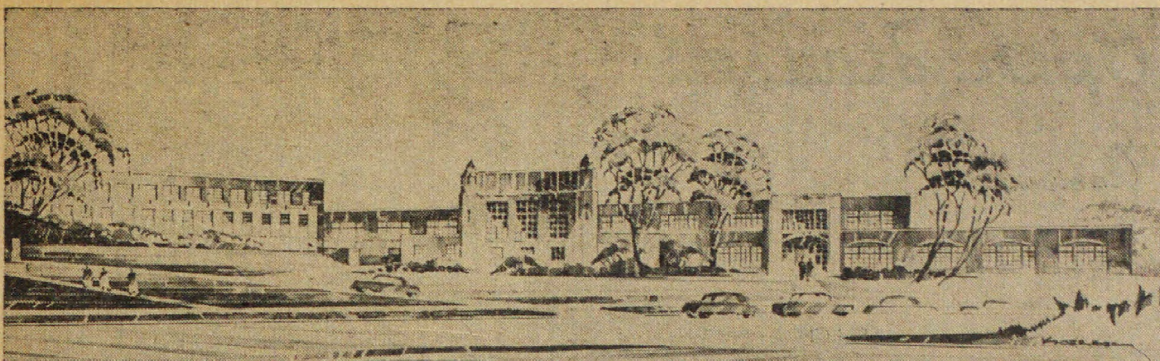

and the Development Office has expressed confidence that the entire amount will be realized in the three-year period.

In adding the three buildings mentioned above, the University will add greatly to its recreational and classroom facilities. Offices for virtually all student organizations and activities will be located in the new Union Bldg., as well as a new 700-seat cafeteria, an enlarged snack bar, lounges, card and pool rooms, and a faculty dining room.

Much-needed classroom space for the ROTC and other academic departments will be added in the Transportation Hall. Office and storage space for the military science department will also be made available.

Upon completion of the proposed million-dollar Gymnasium, the brown wooden structure which currently serves as a gym will be torn down. The Union Bldg. will be completed to form an integral part of the quadrangle, and will be joined with the two dormitories by a multi-arch arcade.

Space in the Administration Bldg. made vacant by the removal of the Cafeteria will be turned into a new and enlarged Student Chapel, and badly-needed faculty offices.

The development fund drive, which is still under way, is organized into four main divisions. These give a broad coverage of Cleveland business and industry; Carroll faculty, students, and alumni; special gifts and trusts. In addition there is a special women's division.

Fr. Welfle Picked For Three Honors

Cited for his outstanding leadership as President of John Carroll University, the Very Rev. Frederick E. Welfle, S.J., was this week named "Man-of-the-Year" by the Heights Council, Knights of Columbus.

The K. of C. award was the third major honor to be paid to Fr. Welfle this spring. On March 15 the Heights Chamber of Commerce presented him with its citation as "Man-of-the-year," and on April 2, Fr. Welfle was elected president of the Ohio College Association.

Each of the two local awards paid tribute to the priest for his industry in carrying out a vast building and development program at the University since he first assumed the presidency in August, 1946.

During Fr. Welfle's tenure, four buildings have been erected, the ROTC added to the curriculum, and enrollment increased from less than 500 to nearly 2700.

ances of Kevin McDonough, in the role of Gen. Glenthauer, and Alverda Solens, as Ana, his adopted daughter.

Other members of the cast include Frank Stringer, Thomas Skulina, John English, E. John Sillings, Paul Zelter, Rosemary Pietroniro, Richard Murphy, and John Hughes.

Written by Michael Gallagher, a Carroll graduate in 1952, the play is set today in East Berlin, and in the words of Mr. Leone J. Marinello, director, is "a modern morality."

It deals with the struggle in Glenthauer's mind between his fear of capture by West German forces which want him as a war criminal, and his hatred of the East German puppet Communist government which wants him to lead their newly-created army.

For the LTS, the performances marked two important "firsts." The play was the first original work the group has ever produced, and it was also the first play written by a Carroll Alumnus to be performed at the University.

Author Gallagher was a star in several LTS productions, including the role of Creon in "Antigone." He served two years with the Army in Japan following his graduation, and in 1954 joined the Society of Jesus. Gallagher is at present a Jesuit novice at Milford, Ohio.

There are approximately 40 extra-curricular organizations at John Carroll. They range in scope of activity from the Philosophy Club, to the Amateur Radio Club, to the Model Railroad Club. Of these 40, most are characterized by a particular community of interest: some special talent the members have in common with one another.
