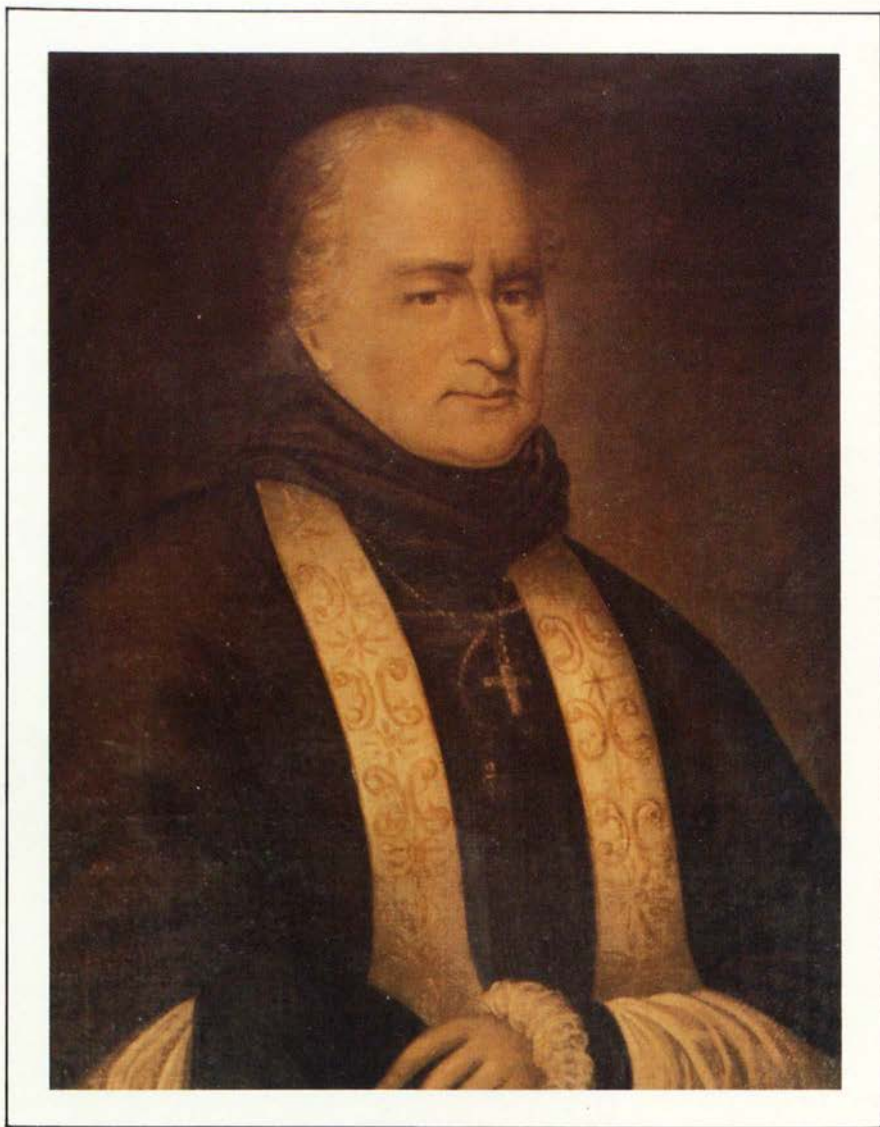

ARCHBISHOP JOHN CARROLL,
AMERICAN EDUCATOR

(1735-1815)

This year, 1989, celebrates *The Bicentennial of Jesuit Education in the United States*, as well as *The Bicentennial of the Establishment of the Catholic Hierarchy in the United States*.

It was at White Marsh, Maryland that the Catholic Church in the new republic was organized, that the suppressed Jesuit priests decided to incorporate their landholdings, that the first Catholic school of higher education was planned and, more importantly since this year is a bicentennial year, that John Carroll was named Bishop of Baltimore and so, the first Catholic bishop of the United States.

In September of 1923, John Carroll University changed its name from St. Ignatius College to honor him — a Jesuit until the suppression in 1773, well-read, grounded in history and theology, possessed of definite ideas about a liberal arts education, and open to the new experience of the young Church in the United States. Were it not for Bishop Carroll's determination to secure a place for Catholics in the new republic, many great institutions — such as John Carroll University — would not exist today.

The portrait of Archbishop John Carroll displayed on the cover of this program was painted (ca. 1806-1813) by Jeremiah Paul, Jr. The painting is exhibited in the Chancery Office of the Archdiocese of Baltimore.
