Escort service shifts into high gear

In an attempt to avoid assaults on campus, Campus Security has taken additional precautionary measures by dramatically increasing its escort service. With the co-

operation of the Knights of Columbus, the escort service has become more visible and efficient, and is available to anyone wishing to use it.

The incident on campus last November, with the strong

possibility of the suspect being linked to the recent rape of a Cleveland State student, brought on several security changes. Recent sightings of a possible suspect inside University buildings, including the library last Sun-

day, has heightened the desire for a bolstered escort service.

"A tremendous need for an efficient escort service has developed this past year, and it's a fine gesture by the Knights to provide this service," said Dr. James Lavin, Dean of Student Affairs. "If

taken seriously and taken advantage of by students, I'm sure ... it will enhance the safety of the campus community."

Telephones are available in virtually every building on campus in order to make calling for escorts convenient.

Network supports seniors ...

The John Carroll Placement Office presents another program to aid students in the job-searching task. The most recent of these developments is entitled the "Alumni Career Network", a program which offers essential details and valuable insights into a variety of careers.

The program is conducted with the resources of approximately forty alumni in various

careers. Each of these volunteers allows students to visit his place of occupation, offering explanations of entry-level jobs as well as insight into how to "build" a career in that particular area.

The alumni are divided into four groups on the basis of their under-graduate degree at John Carroll. These groups include education, science, liberal arts and business. Each student is placed in one of these groups according to his intended career plans.

The student then arranges an "informal interview" with one of the alumni during which he/she learns the basic guidelines for interviews and receives suggestions from the alumni. After the student has finished the interview, he is expected to return to the Placement Office in order to discuss the benefits and rewards of the program.

According to Fr. James Duffy, director of the Placement/Co-op Office, "it is essential for the students to visit the Placement Office frequently in order to keep abreast of the latest programs and job opportunities." Father Duffy also suggests

that students establish certain goals dealing with their career intentions.

The Career Development Department has expanded its offerings to include a Mentorship program for all freshmen. The program has been in the experimental stage for the past two years and has been expanded to allow every freshman the opportunity to participate.

The purpose, according to the program's developer Dr. W.D. Bookwalter, Vice President and Assistant to the President, is "simply to get freshmen at the beginning of college life to see that their career plans are going to vary tremendously and they should use college to prepare for it rather than to exclusively train for an entry-level job."

Secure your future

One topic which is often bantered about these pages is the fear of our evolving into a police state. The year 1984 makes us look with great apprehension at the direction which our society is heading.

Yet the one thing we strive for most is security. We fight for it everyday, whether it be physical, financial or emotional security. The future holds many unexpected events for which we constantly try to prepare.

Last November, the entire Carroll community was shaken from a false sense of security, which the university immediately set about trying to replace with a real one.

The most striking improvement has been the expansion of the escort service. Though Campus Security has always offered an escort service, it was small and unused. The incorporation of the Knights of Columbus into the service adds a needed supply of manpower.

The Carroll News cannot support this move strongly enough. The service now is more widely available, more complete, and more efficient. It allows for the trained members of Campus Security to continue their more specialized duties without being remiss about the safety of individual students.

Also helping to allay the fear of crime is the lightning response of the University Heights police. As last Sunday at the Library showed, local police respond very quickly when called upon.

Only one link remains to finish the chain of improved security: the individual. He or she must use the escort service for it to be effective and be prepared to notify police if the suspect is spotted. Most important, each person must take care to walk in groups and avoid dangerous situations.

As often as we students are told that "it's a jungle there," today's collegians are advised that the future will take care of itself with regard to the real world. We get a mixed bag of "You shouldn't worry about it" and "What do you want to be when you grow up" from our mentors.

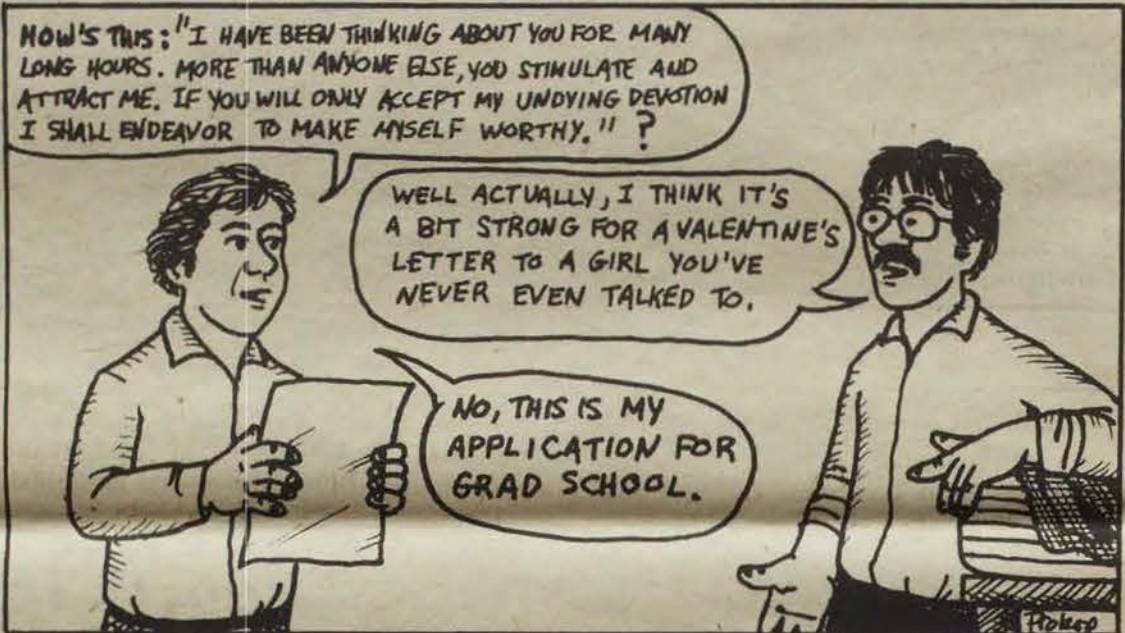
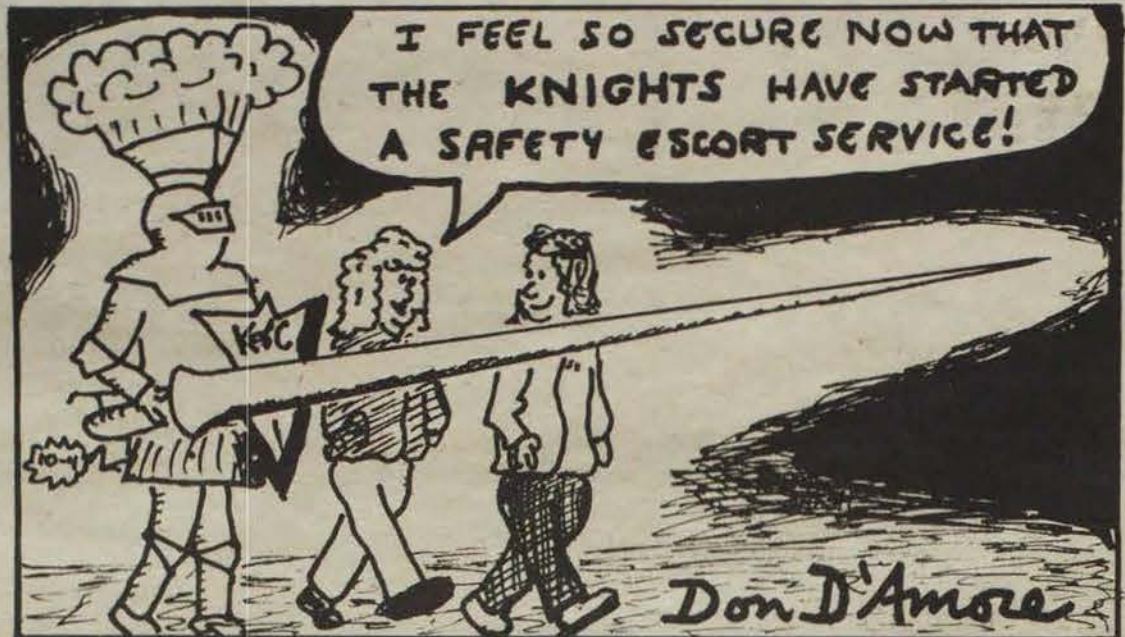
More students here at Camp are asking themselves what they want to be when they grow up, if the increase in career-oriented university programs is any indication. The administration has recently discovered that admission figures are positively related to the placement record of the university, and that today's high school student is more pragmatic than in the recent past.

So far the university has assembled a battery of antidotes designed to counteract the student infection of anxiety which is found in youngsters trying to avoid the unemployment line. The vaccines include the Cooperative Education and Placement programs, the Mentorship program, and the Alumni Career Network.

We feel it is important and necessary that the university make every effort to expose students to career environments and information. Such programs encourage students to compare career paths based on more than the dress codes and salary opportunities of various fields.

Further, graduating students need an edge if they want to be different from all the other job seekers. Career-oriented programs can sharpen skills that a Carroll graduate will need to get employed in the real world. But students must participate in these programs.

As long as the students take advantage of the benefits offered them by these programs, the university's attempts to make the future take care of itself will be justified.

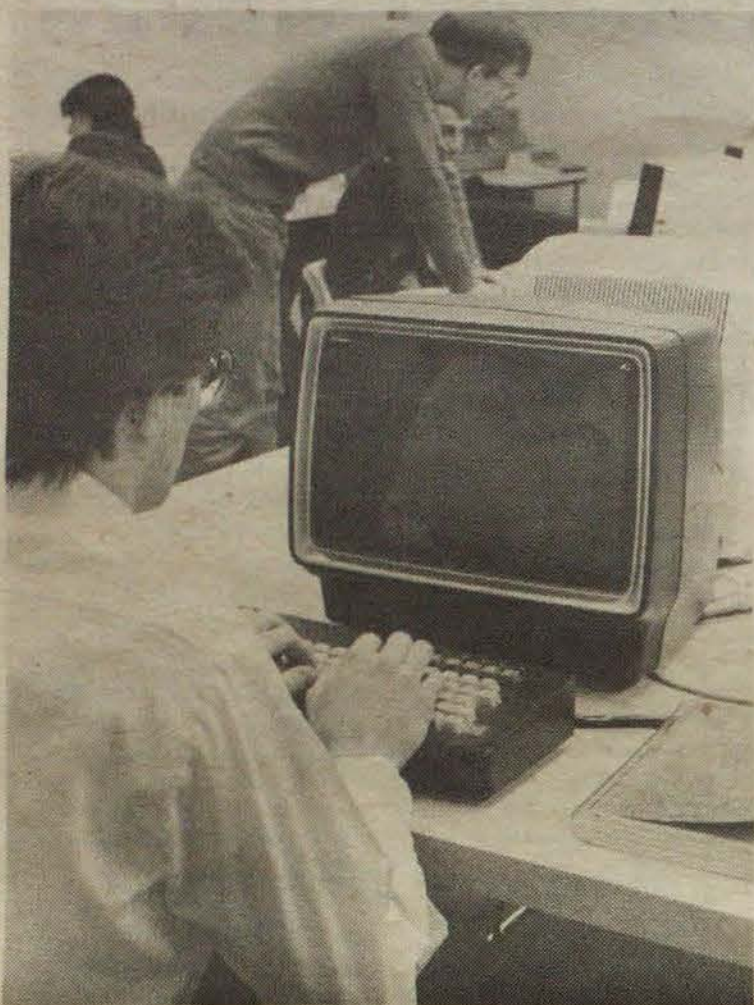

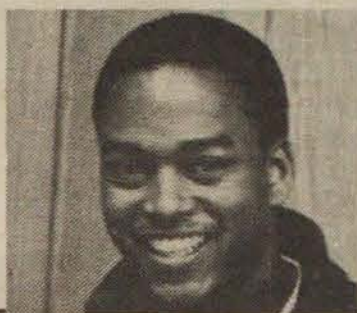

Wrestlers rout three enroute to nationals

Blue Streak wrestlers handed in another flawless set of performances when they outscored their three opponents by a total of 101 to 34 in dual competition last week. Victories over Muskingum, Washington & Jefferson, and Capital boost the Streaks' record to 11-2.

Coach Tony DeCarlo's matmen close their dual season this Sunday at Division I Slippery Rock State.

"Yes, I think we've pretty well exhausted the Division III teams we've faced this

year," stated DeCarlo after last week's sweep at Muskingum. "We're tuning up now for the Division III national tournament."

DeCarlo has reason to take pride in his team's performances. John Carroll whipped Muskingum 41-10, W & J 33-9 and Capital 27-15 — and without the services of two all-Americans. Marty Joseph is still nursing an injury and Nick D'Angelo was taking a graduation examination.

Heading a list of triple winners for the Blue Streaks was heavyweight Mark Sulli-

van. The junior recorded three straight pins, never wrestling more than 1:25 during the day. His record now stands at 17-3, and according to DeCarlo, "Mark is very near a school record for pins in a season. He has eleven now, and the record is fifteen."

Sullivan will have chances at Slippery Rock, the conference meet at Case Western Reserve, February 17-18th, and, hopefully, the national tournament to topple the record.

Other wrestlers recording

clean sweeps on the day were Tom Bennett at 134 pounds, Jeff Anderson at 150, and Barry Broome at 158.

Bennett's record now stands at 22-6, and Anderson manhandled his opponents by scores of 25-4, 7-2, and 8-1 to raise his record to 18-3. The senior, Broome, accounted for a slew of points by pinning

one opponent, decisioning another 10-2, and gaining a forfeit in his other match.

Recently, John Carroll moved from #5 to #3 in the national poll. "I feel we're on schedule," a confident DeCarlo states. "If we can just stay healthy, I think we'll give a run for the money at the Division III title."

"We played very well in the Lake Erie game," said a pleased coach Susie Brown. "It was nice to be able to substitute freely with such a deep bench."

"The Case game was a different story," stated Brown. "We really didn't deserve to win the game. Our fine play at the end of the

game saved us."

The girls traveled to Geneva Friday night in hopes of keeping up with their tremendous improvement over last year but found themselves three points short in what was not one of their better efforts. The next home game is Thursday night against Lake Erie.

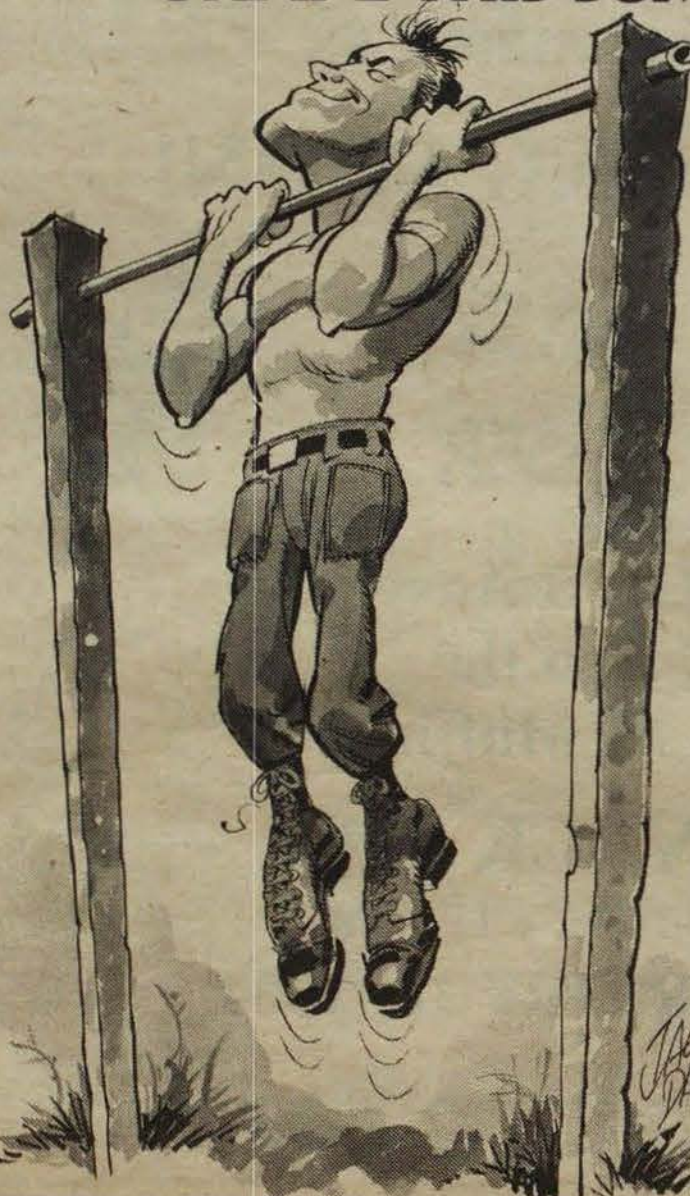

Hoopsters intent on "winning remaining games"

What's happened to that so-so John Carroll basketball team that fell cold offensively and defensively on more than one occasion this season? What happened to the team that had to fight to reverse a lack-luster first half performance in most every game this season?

Well that team is one of the past as the new John Carroll basketball team is a winner. On Wednesday, the Blue Streaks defeated Case Western 58-55 and on Saturday handed Washington & Jefferson their fourth PAC loss by a score of 73-64. The Blue Streaks have now won five of their last six games, assuring them of second place in the PAC, just two games

behind undefeated Hiram.

At Case, the Streaks were lead by the hot combination of Herb Cunningham and Mike Carswell. Herb was 8 for 20 from the field and 9 of 12 from the line, making him high scorer of the game with 25 points. Mike Carswell was only slightly cooler as he went 6 for 7 from the field and 4 of 5 from the line for 16 total points.

At home on Saturday the re-born cagers convincingly defeated Washington & Jefferson before a highly-charged and supportive crowd.

W & J head coach John Unice, commenting on his team's losing effort, stated "We were not aggressive defensively, and aggressive

defense is a must when guys like Cunningham and Cannon are having good nights. We were also very flat-footed under the boards. Carroll was allowed too many second shots."

Whether it was the Streaks' luck under the boards or the heated performances out of Herb Cunningham and his career high 34 points or Jim Cannon and his new career high 20 points, what matters is that the Streaks were hot and played so well that any semblance of a W&J attack was quickly torched.

Coach Baab, obviously pleased with his team's sound performance, commented, "This was probably as good a game we've played all year."

"We saw great effort out of everyone, not just the high

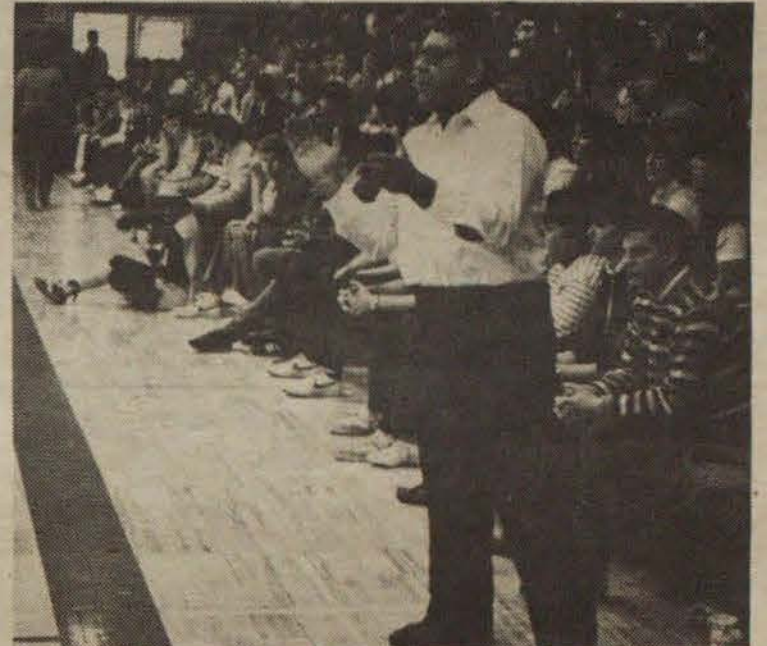
scorers. Our defensive efforts were also very impressive."

The Streaks need to win their remaining six games in order to stay alive in the PAC.

"Our guys know that they can't beat the seventeen game winners of last year, but they know that they can be the second greatest team, and with that in mind, they plan

on winning our six remaining games with the intensity of tonight's game."

The cagers' next game will be away against Allegheny next Wednesday and will then return to Carroll on Saturday to face Thiel at 8:00 in Carroll gym in what promises to be still another winning extravaganza.

John Carroll's Blue Wave swim team was topped in a dual meet for the ninth time in nine years by the nation's fifth ranked squad, the Gators of Allegheny College, Saturday. The final score stood with the Streaks on the short end of a 88-33 score in the men's competition, and 88-25 in the women's.

Sophomore John Pelon won the 200 yard individual medley with a time of 2:06.9 while Mike Brooks finished first in

the one meter diving for the men. Bridget MacNamara qualified for nationals in the 200 yard individual medley for the women winning the event with a time of 2:19.5. She also won the 200 yard breaststroke event.

Some of Carroll's swimmers were disqualified because of the new false start rule that allows for no free false starts. Carroll swimmers claimed that one of the Allegheny swimmers did not come down into position correctly.

A good number of Carroll swimmers should qualify for nationals this year including Weber in the 200 yard breaststroke and John Pelon in the 50 free. The relay team of Roberto Aldave, Paul Schroeder, Mike Weber, and Mark Ferstel is also expected to qualify for the national meet.

"The team is now aiming for the conference championship at Carroll," summed coach Martin. He also remarked, "the team is still tired." The next meet for the lady swimmers is against Duquesne and the state meet at Oberlin college. The men go up against Carnegie-Mellon away this Saturday.

Acting Company "rocks" Kulas Auditorium

Kulas Auditorium, which has rang with the sounds of many great performers in the past, and promises to do much of the same in the future, will be the site of yet another "rocking" event. (No, the Student Union has not yet put in a bid to bring the Rolling Stones here!) This time, the event will "rock" the auditorium in a completely different way, as The Acting Company arrives for a performance of the 1937 classic, *The Cradle Will Rock*.

Marc Blitzstein's, *The Cradle Will Rock* is a fast-paced play that deals with politics in the United States in the late 1930's. In a series of rapidly sketched scenes, this play depicts the control one Mr. Mister possesses over Steeltown, U.S.A. Though in many ways it seems relatively naive today, it brings to light many of the very important social struggles in the 1930's.

When first produced in 1937, it combined musical

comedy form with a strong pro-labor statement in the midst of the Great Depression. Before Orson Welles' and John Houseman's Mercury Theater days, they obtained money for their projects from the Federal Theater Project.

The play was so controversial that the costumes were confiscated and the theater was put off limits. Although another hasty deal was produced at a different theater, the actor's union prohibited the actors from going on the stage. The curtain went up on schedule anyway and the show was performed from a section of seats.

As the play is written, many characters, such as Editor Daily, Reverend Salvation, and Gus Polack, interact with Mr. Mister. The characters represent types of people who in some way or another are trying to satisfy their needs. The simplified storybook characteristics of this play are shaped by Blitzstein into a bold yet lively and fun play.

The Acting Company, on tour for the John F. Kennedy Center, will perform *The Cradle Will Rock* under the direction of John Houseman (sorry, Mr. Houseman himself will not be on campus for the

performance) here at John Carroll University. It will show for one night, Friday, February 17th at 8:30 p.m. as part of John Carroll University's ON STAGE series. It is suggested that tickets be
