## Mackey named alumni trustee president

Jim Mackey, a 1971 graduate of John Carroll, has been selected to serve as President of the National Alumni Board of Trustees for the 1986-88 term.

Mackey was selected for the position after his predecessor, Linda Meglin '74, stepped down after completing one year of the two year term. "It was time to move on and encourage more participation in the group," said Meglin, who has served on the board for seven years

in various positions.

Former executive Vice-President of the board, Mackey commented, "I'm extremely pleased and honored to have been selected. There are a lot of good people who dedicate their time and energy to the alumni program and to be selected from among thousands is a great honor." His involvement with alumni relations began with his position as alumni representative for the class of 1971. Mackey



was also involved with the board of Trustees prior to its national standing, and was the first president of the Cleveland Club.

The National Alumni Board of Trustees organizes fundraising drives for the university, works with the various alumni chapters and helps in managing the affairs of the university's Alumni office.

Various committees, including Athletics, Admissions, Alumni Journal, Alumni Medal and Hall of Fame voters report to the board concerning their individual activities. One of the board's accomplishments for this year is the current display of banners in downtown Cleveland promoting the University's Centennial.

Mackey sees the board as an asset to the Carroll Community and states, "We've increased alumni giving over the past five years and have been active in raising student enrollment. We hope to continue this and want to determine with the administration, other areas where we can direct our efforts to help the school."

## Reunion classes post record attendance

The classes of 1961, 1971, and 1976 have set records for attendance for all 25, 15, and 10 year reunions. For the class of 1976 this marks the second time the same class has set two attendance records. In 1981 the bicentennial class set a record for a five year reunion attendance record.

The record attendance

numbers expected are largely the result of the work of the class chairpersons.

"The centennial year has helped attendance on all levels, but the results are mainly due to the dedicated work of the class chairpersons," said Tim Freeman, Alumni Director.

## New Hall of Famers elected

Four standouts in Blue Streak athletic history have

been named to the athletic Hall of Fame. Lou Duchez '34, Bob Spicer '66, Ralph Vince, and Jack Mulhall '76 will be inducted October 10.

All were nominated by members of the Blue-Gold Club, the athletic booster group, and were approved by the members of the National

Alumni Board of Trustees.

Duchez, a gridiron guard while at JCU, was an all Big Four choice in 1932 and 1933 as well as team captain in 1933. He later coached at Westlake HS for thirty-six years.

## New chapel to be built

Construction for the St. Francis Xavier chapel, which

will be part of the Fritzsche Religious Center, will begin Monday, June 2. The site for the new chapel will be where

the Jardine Room and the present chapel and offices are located.

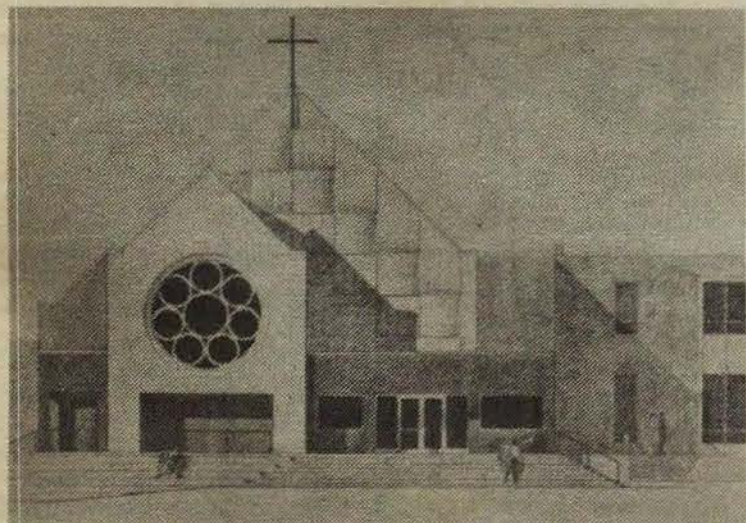
Most of the chapel will be rebuilt, thanks to a gift of one million dollars from Mrs. F.J. O'Neill and the F.J. O'Neill Charitable Corporation in August, 1985.

Fr. Peter J. Fennessy, Vice President for Religious Affairs, stated, "We should be moved out by June 2. That is when they fence off the site for construction."

The chapel will be completed by April 1, 1987, according to John T. Reali, Vice President for Services (Physical Plant).

The new chapel will also house the Campus Ministry office.

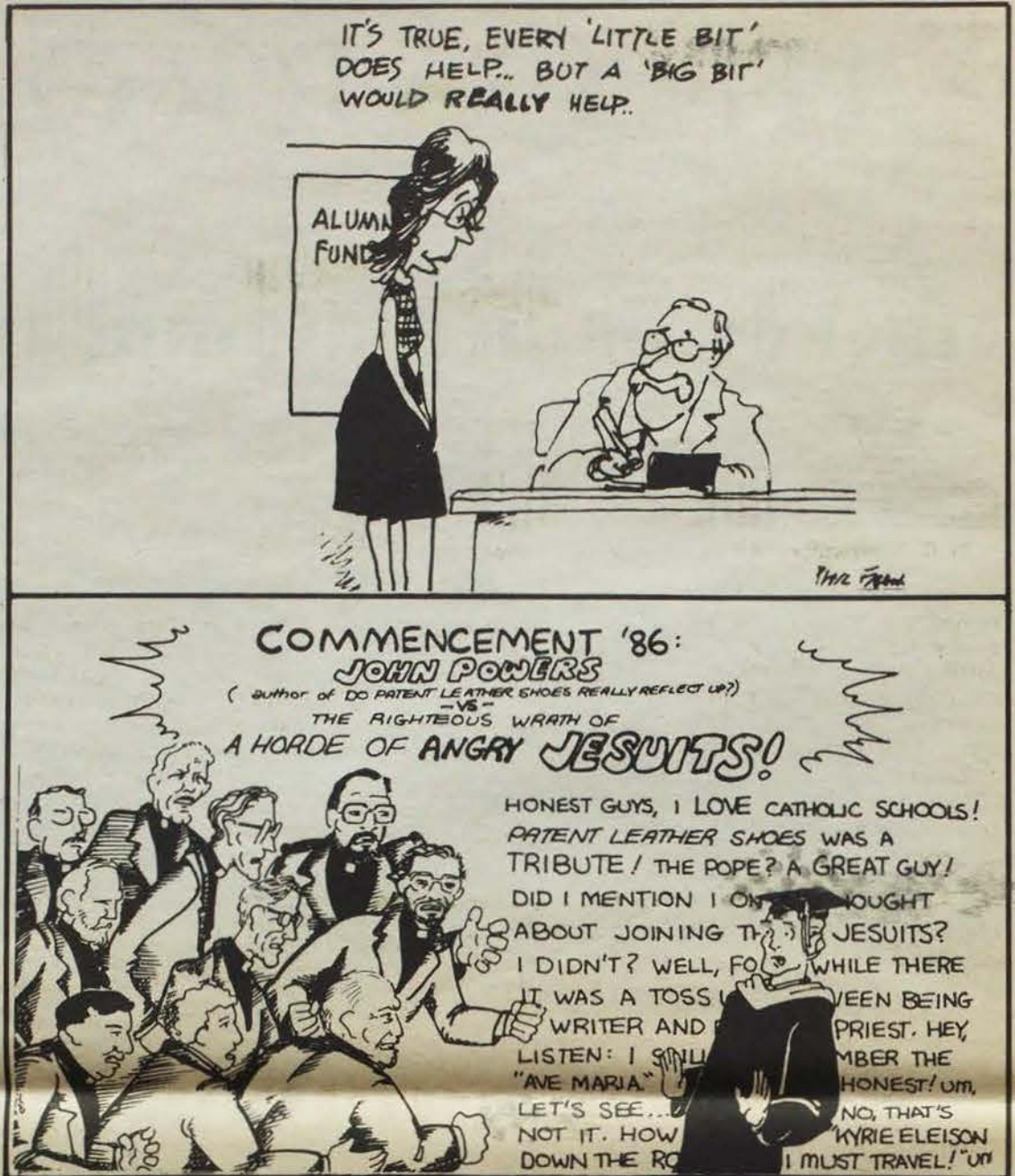

## Pilla's Lawson boycott

Anyone who follows current events would be interested in what has unfolded in Cleveland the past few months. Cleveland Bishop Anthony Pilla '62 released a pastoral letter which called for local Catholics to boycott Lawson's, a local convenience store.

earned the Bishop's wrath through the sale of "adult magazines." These are considered a threat to Catholic morality, and the Bishop urges that Lawson's receive no patronage from his diocese.

In boycotting a retailer, will the church see an end to

pornography? Revco has decided recently to pull "adult magazines" from its Cleveland area shelves, and so one could assume that the Bishop's goal is being accomplished.

But a look at Lawson's, the boycott's main target, sours the victory. In a brilliant marketing move, the company has opened the issue to the general public. Their stores now have ballots at the register which people can fill out to voice their opinion.

Of course, this democracy is not free, and voters are only eligible if they spend a dollar or more. As a result, sales at Lawson's have risen.

Perhaps a better course of action would be to increase pressure on the source of pornography. Retail stores will continue to market profitable items, irregardless of moral content. If Lawson's folds under the Catholic boycott, another store will distribute pornography to a public that demands it.

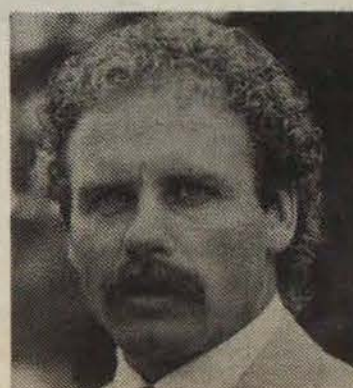
Tim Freeman '78

Arriving at the record amounts requires work which began roughly one year ago. Through a series of calling nights and letters, alumni contact fellow alumni to offer a personal invitation to attend the weekend and to record the alumni responses. For the first time, present JCU students were hired to make the initial calls to alumni before the classmates made calls.

To help insure that the alumni receive first class service and entertainment, the school itself has invested \$70,000 to support the weekend. The money goes toward the operation of the dormitories, the salaries of the staff and providing for the golf outings, airport service, the ethnic festival and fireworks. These are provided in order to make the weekend as convenient to attend as possible.

This year for the first time the weekend is being held in conjunction with commencement. Another first is the opening of events to the city of Cleveland. An ethnic festival will be held under the

big tent on the quad from 6 til 9:45 p.m. with fireworks scheduled for 10:00 p.m. in front of the Administration building.

Overall there has been a 30% increase in attendance since the first reunion

weekend five years ago. Although the concept has remained basically the same, the only changes have occurred in the constant improvement and innovations to make the reunion weekend as great an event as possible.

# '86 Class Gift begins new program

John Carroll University's Class of '86 has undertaken a unique class gift project that will continue for the next decade.

Unlike past graduating classes that have traditionally left something symbolic with the university to remember them by, this year's

graduating class is striving for a continuing financial commitment to assure future classes the same and hopefully better opportunities than the ones they have benefitted from during their stay at the university.

The class' goal is for a \$25 annual commitment from each of its 426 members over

the next ten years. By the class' ten year reunion, a potential of \$106,500 could be attained if every class member participates fully.

The success of this model program can be attributed to the 29 Class Agents which represent the graduating class. According to Class Agents Luke Baum and Mike

Gaertner, 143 Seniors have agreed to the continuing commitment in support of the University. But the Class Agents realize they still have a long way to go in the pursuit of the total class involvement.

## Class Gift questions answered

The Senior Class Gift program was restructured this year to encourage recent alumni to donate funds on a regular basis to the university. What follows is a list of questions and answers concerning the Class Gift Program:

Q: Why is there a need for a Senior Class Gift?

A: Educational instruction, building and renovation costs continue to increase. Alumni from John Carroll will contribute one million dollars in 1985-86 to offset this increase. The Class Gift is an opportunity for the Class of '86 to help keep educational costs down and quality instruction high at John Carroll.

Q: What is the contribution,

and where does the money go?

A: Seniors have chosen to commit a \$25 contribution for their first ten years away from John Carroll. This \$250 pledge represents 13% of the \$1,800 per senior which was donated by concerned alumni during the Senior Class' four years at John Carroll.

Contributions to the Class Gift will be handled by a financial planning council, comprised of five Senior Class Agents. At the five year and ten year reunions, agents attending will meet to discuss plans for the Gift funds. The amount is currently projected at \$60,000.

A: An Agent requests on a

semi-annual basis his or her prospects to make a responsible contribution to John Carroll. A member of the Class of '86 may choose to support the Class Gift, the Annual Fund, or both. All seniors are encouraged to give something back to the University.

A: Each \$25 pledge over ten years will increase the Class Fund by \$450.

years, and alumni are sometimes sighted walking into the sides of newer ones late at night.

This year, the University has implemented two programs to help avoid these hazardous, and often embarrassing, encounters. First of all, they have installed sonic generating devices in the Ad Building, the Library, and the Science Center. These

devices generate a frequency which scares away anybody wearing a wrist ticket after hours, and should help cut down on collisions on that side of campus.

To direct alumni specifically to their dorms, a radio collar will also be issued to each returning Blue Streak. These weather proof devices can transmit and receive signals from the dorm's main office. There, dorm clerks can

monitor the progress of any given alumni throughout the course of the evening on a control map. If the alumnus leaves the bar area alone, and in the wrong direction, mild electric shocks transmitted by the dorm clerk will help steer the wayward safely home.

These devices will be removed at the end of the reunion weekend for a small fee.

## Centennial highlights

**September** — Jean Whalen '86 interviewed President Reagan after outcompeting 200 other students for the opportunity. Whalen's 33 minute interview was broadcast on WUJC and WCLV as well as 1300 other college stations nationwide.

**October** — The Cleveland Orchestra performed exclusively for John Carroll University. The Centennial celebration event was attended by over 500 students at Severance Hall.

**University President T.P. O'Malley** was named University Heights "Citizen of the Year." Mayor Beryl Rothschild also announced the gift of 100 trees to the University in honor of the centennial.

**November** — The Student Union passed a bill requiring all chartered student organizations to send a representative to Student Union meetings. Starting Spring semester, organizations which fail to send at least one member to the meetings are subject to financial penalties, restrictions on facility usage, and possible revocation of their charter.

**January** — Fr. O'Malley and twenty-seven students joined the "March for Life" in Washington D.C. over Christmas break, in protest of the 1973 Roe vs. Wade decision which legalized abortion. Participants marched down Pennsylvania Avenue, past the White House, and to the Capitol.

John Carroll's Seismology Department, led by Fr. William Ott, S.J., registered an earthquake at 5.0 on the richter scale with an epicenter near Chardon, Ohio. The Department is the only facility of its kind in the region.

**February** — The men's Blue Streak basketball team found itself on top of the PAC with a 9-3 record. The cagers headed south for the NCAA Division III playoffs in Danville, Kentucky, but lost in the first round to top seeded LeMoyne-Owen College.

**April** — Michael Anderson '86 was selected by the senior class as this year's Beaudry Award recipient. Anderson has been involved with the Student Union and WUJC during his stay at JCU, and plans to begin medical school at Michigan State this fall.

**May** — Dr. Cyrilla H. Wideman of the Biology department was named the 1986 recipient of the Distinguished Faculty Award.

# Men capture fourth consecutive trophy

A fourth consecutive year as winner of the Presidents' Athletic Conference All Sports Trophy almost had to be shared until a recent discovery in the championship golf standings pushed the Blue Streaks into first place outright in the men's division.

At the first tally of points (7 are awarded for a first place

finish, six for second, etc.), the Blue Streaks had tied the Tartans of Carnegie-Mellon. Each school had accumulated 49.5 points, but a change in the final golf standings gave JCU the crown by one-half point. Two Thiel College players were disqualified, one for an improper score card and the other for failing to

hole out. At that point JCU took over sole possession of third place in the golf championship.

This four year streak is indicative of the caliber of skill present at JCU. But this skein is bested by Allegheny who ran off ten in a row from 1973-82 and Wayne State,

with five straight from 1961-65.

Things didn't look very encouraging after the Fall season concluded. The football team's 2-7 mark was good for a three way tie for fourth, but not the way most hoped the year would begin.

Cross Country and soccer had their difficulties, each nabbing fourth place spots. The disappointing season for

soccer followed last year's stellar season which included a victory over Notre Dame at South Bend.

JCU racked up points over the Winter with wrestling and basketball championships. Spring sports held much for the Blue Streaks, but the many second and third place finishes almost cost the Streaks the outright possession of the trophy.

## Women nipped of All-Sport Trophy

The races for the men's and women's All-Sports trophies were similar in that both were within one-half point of victory.

For the women, it was not a half point in their favor as the Terriers of Hiram squeaked into first place with their championships in track and

field. Three teams: Hiram, Carnegie-Mellon and JCU all were within two points of grabbing the trophy.

Many of the women's teams were bolstered by younger talent from the ranks of the freshmen and sophomores.

A new but familiar coach to JCU helped the basketball and softball teams to record fourth place finishes. Coach Spicuzza returns to JCU after having taught at St. Ann's in Cleveland Heights. Spicuzza has coached at JCU before; first from 1976-77 and then 1978-79.
