

events would be interested in what has unfolded in Cleveland the past few months. **Cleveland Bishop Anthony** Pilla '62 released a pastoral letter which called for local Catholics to boycott Lawson's, a local convenience store.

Anyone who follows current earned the Bishop's wrath through the sale of "adult magazines." These are considered a threat to Catholic morality, and the Bishop urges that Lawson's receive no patronage from his diocese.

> In boycotting a retailer, will the church see an end to

pornography? Revco has decided recently to pull "adult magazines" from its Cleveland area shelves, and so one could assume that the Bishop's goal is being accomplished.

But a look at Lawson's, the boycott's main target, sours the victory. In a brilliant marketing move, the company has opened the issue to the general public. Their stores now have ballots at the register which people can fill out to voice their opinion.

Of course, this democracy is not free, and voters are only eligible if they spend a dollar or more. As a result, sales at Lawson's have risen.

Perhaps a better course of action would be to increase pressure on the source of pornography. Retail stores will continue to market profitable items, irregardless of moral content. If Lawson's folds under the Catholic boycott, another store will distribute pornography to a public that demands it.

Arriving at the record amounts requires work which began roughly one year ago. Through a series of calling nights and letters, alumni contact fellow alumni to offer a personal invitation to attend the weekend and to record the alumni responses. For the first time, present JCU students were hired to make the initial calls to alumni before the classmates made calls.

To help insure that the alumni receive first class service and entertainment, the school itself has invested \$70,000 to support the weekend. The money goes toward the operation of the dor-mitories, the salaries of the staff and providing for the golf outings, airport service, the ethnic festival and fireworks. These are provided in order to make the week end as convenient to attend as possible.

The Senior Class Gift program was restructured this year to encourage recent alumni to donate funds on a regular basis to the university. What follows is a list of questions and answers concerning the Class Gift Program:

Q: Why is there a need for a Senior Class Gift?

A: Educational instruction, building and renovation costs continue to increase. Alumni from John Carroll will contribute one million dollars in 1985-86 to offset this increase. The Class Gift is an opportunity for the Class of '86 to help keep educational costs down and quality instruction high at John Carroll.

September — Jean Whalen '86 interviewed President Reagan after outcompeting 200 other students for the opportunity. Whalen's 33 minute interview was broadcast on WUJC and WCLV as well as 1300 other college stations nationwide.

October - The Cleveland Orchestra performed exclusively for John Carroll University. The Centennial celebration event was attended by over 500 students at Severance Hall.

University President T.P. O'Malley was named University Heights "Citizen of the Year." Mayor Beryl Rothschild also announced the gift of 100 trees to the University in honor of the centennial.

November — The Student Union passed a bill requiring all chartered student organizations to send a representative to Student Union meetings. Starting Spring semester, organizations which fail to send at least one member to the meetings are subject to financial penalties, restrictions on facility usage, and possible revocation of their charter.

January - Fr. O'Malley and twenty-seven students joined the "March for Life" in Washington D.C. over Christmas break, in protest of the 1973 Roe vs. Wade decision which legalized abortion. Participants marched down Pennsylvania Avenue, past the White House, and to the Capitol.

John Carroll's Seismology Department, led by Fr. William Ott, S.J., registered an earthquake at 5.0 on the richter scale with an epicenter near Chardon, Ohio. The Department is the only facility of its kind in the region.

February — The men's Blue Streak basketball team found itself on top of the PAC with a 9-3 record. The cagers headed south for the NCAA Division III playoffs in Danville, Kentucky, but lost in the first round to top seated LeMoyne-Owen College.

April - Michael Anderson '86 was selected by the senior class as this year's Beaudry Award recipient. Anderson has been involved with the Student Union and WUJC during his stay at JCU, and plans to begin medical school at Michigan State this fall.

May - Dr. Cyrilla H. Wideman of the Biology department was named the 1986 recipient of the Distinguished Faculty Award.


Men capture fourth consecutive trophy


